OBJECTIVE OF LITERATURE REVIEW

identify potential facilitators and barriers to evidence use for decision-making in the non-profit sector

THIS LITERATURE REVIEW WILL

1. identify scope of existing research and practiced knowledge,
2. inform larger research project plan and methodology, and
3. offer comparison between literature and project results

HYPOTHESIS

use of evidence will be associated with an organization's size, evaluation capacity, and data management practices
